Independence Day

Independence Day is regarded as the birthday of the United States as a free and independent nation. Most Americans simply call it the "Fourth of July," on which date it always falls.

The holiday recalls the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. At that time, the people of the 13 British colonies located along the eastern coast of what is now the United States were involved in a war over what they considered unjust treatment by the king and parliament in Britain. The war began in 1775. As the war continued, the colonists realized that they were fighting not just for better treatment; they were fighting for freedom from England's rule. The Declaration of Independence, signed by leaders from the colonies, stated this clearly, and for the first time in an official document the colonies were referred to as the United States of America. It is a day of picnics and patriotic parades, a night of concerts and fireworks. The flying of the American flag (which also occurs on Memorial Day and other holidays) is widespread.



Why Did You Join?



Why we each entered the military, the reason we joined, had an effect on several aspects of our service and often on our attitudes toward the VA after separation. Let's consider some reasons for entry and see what you think. You may recognize a few. Maybe you will recognize yours.

It's 5 March 1965, MCRD San Diego, eleven o'clock on the first night in Platoon 219. Lights out and no drills in the dark Quonset hut. Whereas we had not been able, physically or mentally, to converse as human beings while being harassed in Reception Barracks waiting for our platoon to form, suddenly we realized we were temporarily unsupervised and had forever, a little over six hours, before we heard the amplified hiss of a phonograph needle as it first touched the reveille record.

(Whispered) "Hey! Can anyone hear me?"

"I hear you. Shut up. I want do sleep."

"Fxxx you. I want to talk. (Hesitation) Why did you join?"

First one response, then another, then others. Several were followed by "You must be an idiot!" or "You gotta be shxxing me!" or similar helpful comments:

"The judge said it was either the Marines or jail. I've had enough of jail."

"Suzy was pregnant" and the related "I had to have money for child support."

"Dad [or other relative] was a Marine" and the inverse "Dad was in the [some branch other than the Marine Corps] and I wanted to do him one better."

"The babes go for the uniform. I'm getting dress blues and wear them back home when I get leave."

I just listened. There did not seem to be a why-youjoined category for "I stayed up late most nights my first semester at Indiana University, usually didn't get up until 11:00am, and had all morning classes." I could not speak French, so the Foreign Legion was out.

During the fun filled days, weeks, and months that followed some other reasons for joining became obvious, most unspoken. A few had joined to prove to themselves and others that they were tough, i.e., they doubted themselves. Some joined to show off. Some for security: food, shelter, and a little income - \$78 per month. Some to help gain citizenship. Some joined because of patriotism. Two years later some entered because they had been drafted. Their reasons boiled down to service or prosecution. Maybe Canada was in there somewhere. But even those drafted formed attitudes toward their service, attitudes based on what they wanted to accomplish, what they thought they knew about the military, and – for more than a few during war time – what they feared.

Looking back, it seems those who joined for the more positive reasons had the best attitude toward filing for VA benefits; whether education, home loan, or disability compensation. Their expectations for success when they entered and faith in the overall fairness of the military carried over to their expectations for the VA. Sort of a series of selffulfilling prophesies. (Before we go any further, let's stipulate the military and the VA do at times fail to adequately serve even the most positive members and claimants. Incompetent officers, non-veteran adjudicators, just bad luck, whatever. Courts martial, Captain's Mast, hardship discharges, and VA appeals can sometimes mitigate.) Contrast with those who entered the military with neutral or negative expectations who often do not apply for VA benefits when they should and have less success when they do. Unfortunately, negative "Why try?" expectations can become self-fulfilling as well. Claims aren't well prepared, claims are dropped and not pursued, denials are not appealed.

People change. The most patriotic, most optimistic can be beat down by horrible experiences to the point they do not want any contact with anything reminding them of the military, especially the VA. Alternatively, the most cynical and hopeless can be uplifted by those around them, especially a good NCO.

Why did you join? Did it affect your attitude toward VA benefits? �
