Boot Socks:


 sizes 8-12, especially preferred is the Under Armour brand


Hand Warmers:

THAT ANNUAL VA CLINIC PHYSICAL

I can't tell you the veteran's name, but his first name rhymes with "Ron" and his last with "Rowe". So Ron goes to his VA Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) regular, annual physical last year. Ron's about my age, so an electro-cardiogram (EKG) is a standard part of his physical. Ron had been having some flulike symptoms, so he's fully cooperative. Shave the hairs, stick the little color-coded contacts on the skin, fire up the machine, run the paper tape, the tech looks at the tape a little funny but does not say anything. The tech rips off the tape and walks it back to the doctor on duty – still standard procedure.

Then things get a little unusual. The tech, now looking a lot funnier, comes back into the examination room and tells Ron, "Now don't get worried. Everything should be OK. We've called 911 and the ambulance is on the way. It should be here in five minutes. You are going to the hospital."

Time out. Ron had not had any pain in his chest at all. No pain in his left arm, or right arm for that matter; no pain in his jaw; no pain period. No night sweats. He'd been a little more tired than normal, but supposed that was due to a mild case of the flu. Maybe a little "pressure" in his chest, but still consistent with flu- or cold-related breathing congestion. No anvils or elephants on his chest. Nothing dramatic.

Time in. "To the hospital? Why?"

"You are having a heart attack now. You might want to call your wife and tell her to meet you at the hospital."

Ambulance shows up, backs in next to the clinic door. The EMTs jump out, pop open the back doors of the ambulance, slide out the gurney, snap down the wheeled legs, and roll the gurney to Ron's examination room. Ron, still dumfounded, is placed on the gurney, strapped on, wheeled out and placed into the ambulance. One of the EMTs tells him on the way, "You are not going to the emergency room. You are going straight to the cath lab. They bumped some

other surgical patients to get to you now."

But it was too late to get that last bit of information to Ron's wife. Her name rhymes with "Amanda". Amanda was, understandably, speeding in from east Highway 46. Amanda slides in to a parking space outside the emergency room door, and jogs inside (not too fast, new right knee). No Ron. But a nice person looks up where he is – the cath lab.

Ron watches a series of different ceilings pass by. Somewhere along the route he loses his clothes. He's transferred from the gurney to an operating table. Sharp things are stuck into him, some stay stuck. He's briefed on the procedure. His upper leg, femoral artery is carefully opened and mysterious long thing fed up through his arteries to his heart. By this time Ron's past seeing any of this. He's sleeping.

Ron wakes up. Amanda is there. One of his new surgical friends comes in to tell both of them what happened. Two stents in coronary arteries. One had been almost totally blocked with plaque, one around 90%.

Ron does his therapy, changes his diet, exercises more, lives a few more decades.

Don't screw around. 1) Not all heart attacks have dramatic symptoms. When something's not right, get it checked out. 2) Go to your VA Clinic annual exam. Don't let your name rhyme with "Gone."
